


A CHARITABLE BEQUEST THROUGH A WILL IS THE EASIEST LEGACY GIFT TO ESTABLISH.


In addition to bequests of cash, property owners might also consider giving their home or land to the Preservation Trust through their will.








Evelyn Leatham left a wonderful bequest of property to the Preservation Trust -- her small waterfront home on Lopez Island. Upon receiving it, the Preservation Trust immediately placed a conservation easement on the 7-acre property, permanently protecting its "feeder bluff" shoreline and forest habitat. The Preservation Trust then sold the land and house with the conservation easement in place. Proceeds from the sale were divided between the 2007 Watmough Bight capital campaign on Evelyn's beloved Lopez Island and the Preservation Trust's permanent Endowment Fund.



When a **gift of property** is received, the San Juan Preservation Trust immediately identifies and permanently protects any important natural values on the land. Once these values are conserved, the Preservation Trust decides whether to retain ownership of the preserve or to sell the property with the permanent protections in place and use the proceeds to protect other priority island land.

Property owners who wish to pass their land to their heirs might consider donating a **conservation easement** to ensure that natural values on their land will be permanently protected while allowing their heirs to enjoy or sell the property. In some cases, estate taxes can force heirs to contemplate selling beloved family properties. In these situations, representatives of an estate may grant a **post-mortem conservation easement** on property, thereby significantly reducing estate taxes.



Life estate gifts allow an individual to donate her home or land to the Preservation Trust while retaining the right to live in or use it for the duration of her life (or through the life of a specified heir, or for a specific term of years). This gift may also entitle the donor to an immediate income tax benefit. When the term of the life estate has ended, the Preservation Trust will protect any important natural values on the property with a conservation easement before deciding whether to retain ownership of the property or sell it with the easement in place. If sold, the proceeds would be used to protect more island land in the future.

Should you wish to consider leaving land or a conservation easement to the Preservation Trust, we strongly encourage you to discuss your plans with us so that you may be assured that the Preservation Trust is able to fulfill your ultimate wishes for your property.



Life Estate: After placing a restrictive conservation easement on his property near Surgarloaf Hill on San Juan Island, Bob Roseburg donated his land to the Preservation Trust with a reserved life estate. The Preservation Trust shares in the responsibilities of land ownership, and Bob continues to live on his beautiful hilltop property with the knowledge that his land will remain protected in perpetuity.




