





DEAR PARTNER IN CONSERVATION,

Looking for a beneficial plant to brighten your backyard landscape in late summer and fall? The spiky, rich yellow blooms of Canada goldenrod (*Solidago canadensis*) could be a just the ticket.

When you plant a native wildflower like C. goldenrod, you don't just plant a flower, you help build a life-giving future for bees, butterflies, and other pollinators. Goldenrod provides a nutritious banquet for 59 known species of butterfly and moth caterpillars in our region. Over millennia, goldenrod has evolved alongside a diversity of insects, including specialist bees that depend on its pollen and chemical makeup to reproduce. With a long blooming period, goldenrod also provides late summer nectar for our island pollinators.

In a time where 8 of land in the U.S. is privately owned—it matters what species of plants we choose to grow. Landscaping and gardening in a way that strengthens the biological cycle is ever more important.
